



## Sanford Glazer

October 30, 1930 - May 29, 2026

Sanford “Sandy” Glazer, age 95, passed away peacefully on Friday, May 29, 2026, while doing what he loved most—working in his yard.

Born to the late William and Gertrude Glazer, Sandy lived a long, full, and happy life centered on family, hard work, and service to his country. A proud United States Army veteran, Sandy honorably served during the Korean War as a Combat Engineer. His military service reflected the dedication, resilience, and patriotism that he carried throughout his life.
